Lisbon Council and Allianz Launch European Growth and Jobs Monitor



On 26 February, the Lisbon Council and Allianz SE launched the European Growth and Jobs Monitor: Indicators for Success in the Knowledge Economy. Using newly developed criteria to analyse the economy, the study found that – thanks to improved job creation and better economic performance – Europe is making faster progress on the economic and social front than many people realise. Compiled under the guidance of Prof. Dr. Michael Heise, chief economist at Allianz, the study found that Sweden ranked No. 1 in meeting the so-called Lisbon criteria. Germany also scored high. Belgium weighed in at No. 2, having shown the most improvement in the last year, while France and Italy lagged behind. Released on the eve of the European Council's annual spring summit on economic reform, the study generated wide press coverage in major media outlets, including Financial Times, Le Monde, Handelsblatt, Neue Zürcher Zeitung and many others. Speaking in the German Bundestag, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said the study "gives us courage to pursue further reform steps." EU Economic and Monetary Affairs Commissioner Joaquín Almunia also praised the report, noting that "it provides encouragement to continue on the path of reforms which is the only way to deliver a better and brighter future for Europe." The 2007 Growth and Jobs Summit: A Resounding Success

On 27 February, the Lisbon Council convened its fourth annual Growth and Jobs Summit. Held in the week leading up to the spring European Council when EU leaders take stock of the Lisbon process, top speakers included Michael Glos, minister of economy and technology and chairman of the Competitiveness Council during the German EU Presidency and Angel Gurría, secretary-general of the Organisation for Economic Co-Operation and Development (OECD), who delivered a landmark address on human capital. In addition, newly appointed Commissioner for Consumer Affairs Meglena Kuneva outlined her vision of how robust





consumer policy can create jobs and drive forward prosperity in her first major policy address to a Brussels think tank. In attendance were over 150 high-level guests, who used the occasion to get up to speed on the latest thinking on the Lisbon Agenda. As at previous Lisbon Council events, we were pleased to be joined by College of Europe students, who contributed greatly to the meeting with their dynamism, curiosity and intense interest in EU affairs.

Jean-Claude Trichet Address at Sustainability Initiative



On 04 June, the Lisbon Council hosted Jean-Claude Trichet, president of the European Central Bank, who delivered The 2007 Jean Monnet Lecture. Taking part in the Lisbon Council's ongoing Sustainability Initiative, President Trichet called on member states to use the economic recovery to consolidate public finances and prepare for an ageing population. Looking ahead, he pointed to four particularly important challenges: raising the employment rate, increasing competition, unlocking business potential and supporting an innovative environment. At the same time, President Trichet highlighted how monetary union has helped Europe increase its competitiveness and prosperity, and delivered a vigorous defence of price stability and fiscal discipline. Flexicurity at Zukunftssalon: Forum for the Future





Co-hosted by Poul Nyrup Rasmussen, president of the Party of European Socialists, former prime minister of Denmark and architect of the original flexicurity reforms, Lisbon Council's the Zukunftssalon: Forum for the Future brought together key stakeholders in the current policy debate. Participants from the EU institutions were joined by Dr. Martin Baily, senior fellow at the Brookings Institution and member of the Lisbon Council Board of

Economists, and Marina Hoffmann, senior adviser at Dansk Metal trade union. Much of the debate focused on the upcoming European Commission communication on flexicurity, and the need to ensure that more and better jobs are created, in line with the goals laid out in the Lisbon Agenda. There was broad consensus that flexicurity must be accompanied by active labour market policies, as well as a concerted investment strategy in life-long learning.

Climate Change Action Group Convenes

Following on the heels of our landmark event with Al Gore last October, the Lisbon Council officially launched its Climate Change Action Group on 07 June. Jos Delbeke, director for climate change at the European Commission's DG Environment, kicked off the debate with a presentation of the European Commission's priorities and plans in the field of climate change. Fridtjof Unander, deputy executive director at Enova, a leading Norwegian agency in the area of environmental innovation and technology, weighed in with an advance look at his forthcoming policy brief: An Action Plan for Curbing Global Climate Change. Among the discussants were senior climate change experts from Allianz, ArcelorMittal, IBM, Philips, Progressio Foundation, Schlumberger Carbon Services, Statoil and Veolia.





Skills for the Future

Following the successful Jobs of the Future study, this report, published together with Accenture, examined the imperative of





bringing government, business and individuals together to develop the skills and human capital Europe needs to excel in a fast-moving global economy. The analysis explained the implications of the rise of the knowledge economy, and examined the responsibilities of different stakeholders - from the individual level, to the organisational and policy levels. Particular emphasis was placed on how to facilitate the necessary change and accompany the process of upgrading skills sets. On 24 April, the report's principal author, Mark Spelman, chief strategist for Europe at Accenture, led a high-level working group on skills and human capital development. Given its timely focus on skills, the report has received significant attention and press coverage, including two articles in Financial Times as well as a feature in Belgian business magazine Trends Tendances. In March, Paul Hofheinz, president of the Lisbon Council, accompanied Al Gore during a visit to Brussels which included, inter alia, a meeting with Prime Minister Guy Verhofstadt. In May, Ann Mettler, executive director of the Lisbon Council, met with Alan Johnson, then UK secretary of state for education and skills, for a discussion on human capital development.

Lisbon Council principals also took an active part in numerous events, among them the OECD World Forum in Istanbul, the International Benchmarking Forum in Basel, a Policy Network workshop in collaboration with the Portuguese Presidency in Lisbon, the EBN Annual Congress in Canterbury, the Centre for European Reform Lisbon Scorecard launch in London and the College of Europe's Intensive Seminar series in Bruges.
