LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR FRIENDS,

Is the glass ever really half empty? And does it sometimes only ever seem to be half full? Psychologists have posed this conundrum for decades, nudging us to see a reflection of our soul in the very water that we drink. But perhaps the truth is more simple – the glass is both half empty and half full. It produces a mixed picture, a positive and negative interpretation, both views equally true and equally deceiving. Its true essence may be neither the good nor the bad it evokes, but the fact that the two states are the same, inexorably united in a single, solitary whole.

This could be said of 2010, a dreadful year for Europe, but a stellar year for the Lisbon Council. On the European front, we lumbered painfully through a debt and sustainability crisis as serious as any that has ever confronted an advanced civilization. Unemployment reached the socially tragic level of 10% in the eurozone as early as February 2010 – and stayed there stubbornly throughout the year. Our leaders met and decided - failing singularly to convince; so they met again and decided again and again failed to convince. As the year ends, the growth rate in Europe is an anemic 1.8% a full percentage point lower than the US, where the 2009 recession was nonetheless shallower and less long-lived.

But the Lisbon Council is thriving – though we would clearly trade all of this success for more signs of real progress in the areas we care so much about. In 2010, we published six outstanding policy briefs,

engaged three superb new thought leaders as fellows, convened seven working groups and held five well-attended VIP summits. Our work continues to enjoy excellent traction with policy makers and the media (we were quoted throughout the year in pretty much every major European news outlet, and welcomed a host of commissioners, corporate leaders, top thinkers and other VIPs to our often-oversubscribed events.). And our fundraising broke all records as well - we raised €833,837.61 in 2010 through a combination of competitively-tendered grants and private-sector giving, crossing the €800,000 mark for the first time in a single year.

The real tragedy is that we weren't able to do more. This crisis is precisely the one we have been warning about – and working to prevent. It poses a direct threat to our way of life brought on by years of low growth, fiscal mismanagement, flagging competitiveness

and living consistently beyond our means. Curiously, the answers are as simple as the diagnosis – raise growth, live within our means, invest for the future and educate our population to meet the challenges of tomorrow. But the trick will be figuring out how we get there – and forging the necessary consensus to make it all possible.

To all of those who joined us in 2010, or read one of our policy briefs, or gave us the greatest gift that you can give – your time and attention – I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart. Is the glass half empty or half full? It's up to us to make sure it's the latter. Thanks for your trust and engagement.



European Comission proposes Europe 2020 Strategy.

If Not Now, Then When?



Ann Mettler publishes If Not Now, Then When? Using Europe 2020 to Move from Crisis Management to Restoring Confidence and Growth, a new policy brief which looks at the benefits – and imperative – of embracing an ambitious social and economic reform agenda. The Lisbon Council collaborates with the European Commission to identify partners for a major Europe 2020 outreach. In the end, the following groups were identified to support and animate the launch of the Europe 2020 strategy, which took place in eight member states between April and September: Ágora Talentia (Spain), demosEUROPA (Poland), Foundation for the Rights of Future Generations (Germany), Group of Applied Economics (Romania), HEC (France), Hungarian Academy of Science (Institute for World Economics), Itinera (Belgium) and Sörmland Region (Sweden).



JUL

Seven European banks fail Committee of European Banking Supervisors stress test, which is itself condemned as too weak and inconclusive. In Spain, youth unemployment reaches 46.2%.



Against the backdrop of deepening crisis, the Lisbon Council launches Good Governance for the Euro Area: Proposals for Economic Stability, a policy brief that proposes a nine-step plan for ending the ongoing crisis and improving European economic governance, written by Alessandro Leipold, chief economist of the Lisbon Council and former acting director of the European department at the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Mr. Leipold and Paul Hofheinz, take part in a Board-Level European Central Bank workshop on Strengthening Economic and Monetary Union Governance.

Trouble begins brewing in Ireland; bond spreads in Portugal and Spain widen.

26 oct

On the eve of a European Council meeting called to adopt far-reaching proposals for reform of euro-area governance, the Lisbon Council convenes **The 2010 Euro Summit**. Olli Rehn, European commissioner for economic and monetary affairs, delivers **The 2010 Ludwig Erhard Lecture**. The Lisbon Council launches **The 2010 Euro Monitor**, produced jointly with Allianz, which evaluates and ranks eurozone countries' comparative strengths.

27 OCT

European Commission publishes a communication on *Towards a Single Market Act: For a Highly Competitive Market Economy*, vowing to complete the Digital Single Market "to stimulate growth and boost citizens' confidence."





NOVEMBER

16 NOV The Lisbon Council convenes a **High-Level Working Group on Skills and Human Capital in European Cities and Regions**, which highlights new research on skills and human capital from the European Commission, the World Bank, the Lisbon Council and the China Centre for Human Capital and Labour Market Research. The event was held to gather leading principals together to peer-review ongoing research and a new publication, which the Lisbon Council will publish in 2011.

European Commission presents communication on *CAP Towards 2020*.

DECEMBER

29 NOV United Nations Framework Convention on-10 DEC Climate Change (UNFCCC) convenes in Cancún.

The European economy grew 1.7% in 2010, more than one percentage point less than the US (2.8%) even though the recession there had been less deep. Twenty-three million Europeans remained unemployed, more than 4.7 million of them under the age of 25. Financial markets were unconvinced by the various *ad hoc* packages cobbled together to restore "confidence," with many proposals still unapproved and other measures deemed too little, too late.

07 DEC The Lisbon Council hosts the European launch of PISA 2009, the ground-breaking OECD study on educational performance.

09 DEC Just days before European leaders gathered in Brussels, the Lisbon Council convenes The Innovation Union Summit to discuss next steps on this key European initiative. Among the VIPs taking part are Vincent Van Quickenborne, minister for economy and administrative simplification of Belgium (which then held the EU rotating presidency); Michel Praet, adviser for science and innovation to President Herman Van Rompuy; Martin Schuurmans, chairman of the board at the European Institute of Innovation and Technology; Mark Spelman, global head of strategy at Accenture, Rudolf Strohmeier, deputy director-general of European Commission's directorate-general of research and innovation, and Anthony D. Williams, senior fellow for innovation at the Lisbon Council and co-author of best-selling books Wikinomics: How Mass Collaboration Changes Everything and Macrowikinomics: Rebooting Business and the World.

The Lisbon Council looks forward to welcoming Connie Hedegaard, European commissioner for climate action, early in 2011 for an extensive debrief on the Cancún talks.

GOVERNMENT OF THE FUTURE

Meglena Kuneva

The 21st century will bring great challenges to government agencies. Never before have the demands on government been so high, as the size and scope of benefits extends to more and more people while governments face growing strain on the resources available to deliver. But it is also a time of great opportunity. Put simply, modern technology, the rise of social networks and new advances in data management permit a different approach, offering governments a chance to deliver better services, to respond more quickly and effectively to citizens' needs and to bring the citizens themselves much closer to government.

Together with the College of Europe and Accenture, the management consulting firm, the Lisbon Council conceived and launched The Government of the Future Centre, a burning platform for discussion, debate and analysis of the challenges government will face in the 21st century – and the solutions at their disposal. At the centre of this initiative is an innovative case-study programme involving students from the College of Europe, who are divided into four teams and assigned an individual government agency in an EU member state to analyse for one year. Later, the case studies are judged by a jury, made up of leading members of the Government Executive **Innovation Circle**, and presented at **The** Government of the Future Summit, held each

year in Brussels. The Government Executive Innovation Circle also meets periodically in Brussels for theme-based high-level workshops.

The Government of the Future Centre kept a busy agenda during 2010. The Government Executive Innovation Circle met three times in Brussels: once for a fascinating working group with Paola Testori Coggi, director-general of European Commission's directorate-general for health and consumers, who provided an overview of the healthcare challenges Europe will face in coming years. Pier Carlo Padoan, chief economist and deputy secretary-general of the OECD, delivered the keynote at The 2010 Government of the Future Summit. The student case studies were published in **Building a Better Future in an Age of Transformation**.

In many ways, the future is here already. And, in a year when Europe's obsession with process and capacity for introspection seemed on prominent display, the Lisbon Council chose to focus not just on short-term policy dilemmas but also on the longer term challenge of restoring growth and helping Europe rise to the competitive challenges of the 21st century. This means first and foremost innovation – the challenge of doing things differently, of delivering better outcomes, of producing products of the highest level and delivering services faster, better and more reliably.

Among other activities, the Lisbon Council convened two high-level summits – **The 2010** Innovation Summit and The Innovation Union **Summit.** These high-level summits brought together key policy makers and thought leaders from around the globe. Among the VIPs who spoke at the two summits are Máire Geoghegan-Quinn, European commissioner for research, innovation and science (who outlined her innovation agenda in her first policy address since becoming European commissioner for research, innovation and science); Xavier Damman, co-founder and chief technology officer at Storify; Larry Hirst, chairman of IBM EMEA; Rian Liebenberg, engineering director at Google; Michel Praet, adviser for research and innovation in the cabinet of President Van Rompuy; Vincent Van Quickenborne, minister of economy and administrative simplification of Belgium; Martin Schuurmans, chair of the board of European Institute of Technology; Mark Spelman, global head of strategy at Accenture; Peter Wierenga, CEO of Philips Research and Andrew Wyckoff, head of the science, technology and industry directorate at the OECD.

Anthony D. Williams, award-winning author of Wikinomics: How Mass Collaboration Changes Everything and Macrowikinomics: Rebooting Business and the World, joined the team as senior fellow for innovation. the environment; Al Gore, former US vice

Metzger, chief negotiator in UN talks for the EU. In 2010, Janez Potočnik, commissioner for the environment, launched his resource efficiency initiative at the Lisbon Council, and joined the Eco-Innovators Network for a working lunch and strategic brainstorming session. Lykke Friis, Danish minister for climate and energy, also met with the group, inviting their comments on Denmark's EU energy action plan, to be unveiled under the 2012 Danish EU presidency.

DIGITAL ECONOMY

The world is undergoing a fundamental transformation from the industrial age towards an economy based on knowledge. At the core of this revolution are Internet-based technologies, which create innovative ways of bringing people together, empowering businesses and consumers, creating jobs and spurring much-needed economic growth. In an effort to capitalise on the spectacular potential of the digital era, the European Union designed the Digital Agenda, a flagship programme of the Europe 2020 Strategy.

In 2010, the Lisbon Council intellectually accompanied this important initiative and organised the Digital Confidence Initiative, a major summit devoted to improving consumer confidence and security on the Internet. Viviane Reding, vice-president of the European Commission and commissioner for justice, fundamental rights and citizenship, delivered a fascinating keynote. She explained how the digital agenda – and successful completion of the digital single market – could create jobs and opportunities, and be a key driver of innovation. Her address was preceded by an

interactive, high-level panel discussion on *Creating Trust and Confidence on the Digital Single Market through Citizen Empowerment, Transparency and Monitoring Mechanism*. Among distinguished panellists were Lena Ek, member of the committee on industry, research and energy and member of the bureau at the European Parliament; Peter Hustinx, European data protection supervisor; Matthew Key, chairman and CEO of Telefónica Europe and Mario Monti, president of the Bocconi University and author of the report on the single market commissioned by President Barroso.

SKILLS AND EMPLOYMENT

As the crisis deepened in 2010, the Lisbon Council expanded and deepened its research capabilities in skills and human capital, building on the cutting-edge work of **The Human Capital Centre**, founded in 2007. Specifically, the group received a research grant awarded in a competitive tender from the European Union's Programme for Employment and Social Solidary – PROGRESS (2007-2013) to adapt its cutting-edge method for measuring (and comparing) human capital policy outcomes to European regions and cities. The grant allowed the group to launch a strategic partnership with the EU2020 Regions Network and to hire new researchers, who set about studying human capital policies in seven leading European cities. The results of the research project are expected in 2011.

In 2010, the Lisbon Council convened a High-Level Working Group on Skills and Human Capital to examine the methodology and launch a vital peer review of the upcoming report. Lars Sondergaard, senior economist for education and principal author of the World Bank's flagship report on skills; Xavier Prats Monné, deputy director-general at the European Commission's directorate-general of education and culture and regional leaders from business and academia joined the breakout sessions, where they shared experience and best practice in the human capital field.

The Lisbon Council also continued to collaborate with the OECD on this key agenda, hosting two high-level events: the European launch of the 2009 Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA), the OECD's flagship study on global educational attainment, and the global launch of The High Costs of Low Educational Performance, a cutting-edge OECD publication which was written and presented by Andreas Schleicher, head of the PISA project and senior adviser on education policy to the secretary-general of the OECD.



LOOKING FORWARD »

In 2011, the Lisbon Council will stay active in the field of skills and employment, where it has attained a leading role through its research and events. *Inter alia*, it will host **The Human Capital in European Regions and Cities Summit**, where László Andor, European commissioner for employment, social affairs and inclusion, will deliver the keynote.


